Introduction

Our Christian Values are at the centre of everything we do at Trinity and St Michael's Church of England & Methodist Primary School (TSM). They help us to learn how to 'do everything in love and live life in all its fullness' by shaping our attitudes and behaviours. Each half term, we focus on a different Christian Value. This is done explicitly through our Collective Worship, but also through our curriculum especially RE and PSRHE. Children have regular opportunities to

reflect on each value and develop an understanding of the value in action. Each Friday, in our Prayer and Praise Worship, we acknowledge children who have demonstrated these values and also share examples of people, discovered across the curriculum, who have also demonstrated our values in action.

As a Church of England and Methodist Primary School, we have very close connections with St Michael's and All Angels Anglican Church and Trinity Methodist Church in our village of Coston. Our chaplains and visitors from church regularly lead our worship to help us to reinforce our understanding of each value as they share stories from the Bible.

We believe our Christian values form the framework on which our school community is built. Are values are embedded in our actions and attitudes, our planning and in our policies. Our key values help us to explicitly live out a life inspired by that of Jesus. They colour and shape our character, our ethos, our aims and the learning experience of all members of our school community.

Although we are always mindful of our 7 core values, we also cover the values of, generosity and service, trust and truthfulness to help cement our Christian foundations. Love is covered as a value in its own right but it is also referred to as the value that is threaded through all other values. "Love is more important than anything else. It's what ties everything completely together." (Colossians 3:14)



Our School Values







The importance of respect, what it means and how it is shown, is discussed regularly with the pupils at TSM. Respecting others starts with self-respect and we at TSM help each other to see the good in one another, building each other up and instilling self-respect. Respect is a word seen regularly on our Code of Conduct (our school rules) and we ensure that children understand that they must give respect to others in order to be respected back.







Our "Love" Thread
