


TOPIC: INTREPID EXPLORERS


The Hobbit is the unforgettable story of Bilbo, a peaceloving hobbit, who embarks on a strange and magical adventure. A timeless classic.




MATHEMATICS



Initially, we will begin our journey in Year Six by revisiting the topic of Place Value which will then lead us into developing our 'formal' <u>calculation methods</u> (parents, think adding subtracting and so on). After grappling with long division, we will then focus on fractions and solidifying our reasoning practice. Alongside these topics, arithmetic will remain a heavy focus as we practise papers to increase our pace and confidence.



On top of this, we will be writing documentary voice-overs, developing a Maya codex and writing letters as Hernan Cortez.



PTHER LEARNING

<u>Science</u>: The Aztecs believed that the heart was a sacred part of the body and often offered it to their gods. As such, we will explore how this amazing organ powers our circulatory system and why we need to make conscious healthy decisions to ensure that it keeps working for us effectively...minus the sacrificing.

<u>Design Technology:</u> The Maya civilisation are often credited with the delectable invention that we gorge on to this day: chocolate. We will be designing and making our very own chocolate bars and packaging after analysing our market research (and some essential taste testing!).

<u>Art:</u> In Art, we will be learning how to use methods to turn 2D scaled drawings into 3D, free-standing sculptures based on characters from our class novel. Please note, we will be rallying for cardboard next half-term!

<u>R.E.</u> In RE, we will be learning about life as a journey and pilgrimage. In this unit, we will look at what it means to make a journey as a Christian and we will also begin to understand the concept of undertaking religious pilgrimage.

<u>P.E.</u> Pok-Ta-Pok was a sacred ball game in Aztec and Mayan cultures. This term, children will be looking at ball-based invasion games, focussing on netball, handball and rugby skills. This will include finding space, the different styles of passing and working as a team! Maybe, with some tweaking, we might be able to play Pok-Ta-Pok ourselves...

<u>Music:</u> You heard it here first! We are going to be experiencing life as if we were practising taking part in a musical, packing our sessions with singing, acting and a dash of recorder practice.

<u>Computing</u>: Ever wondered how to cut the right scene? Splice? Time delay? Manipulate MP3 and MP4 files to produce something more mature? This term, will will develop our knowledge of filming and editing a documentary and then move to Scratch to create an Aztec-inspired game.

<u>French:</u> Je vais en vacances. Linking to our time in Central America, we will be looking at how to plan a holiday abroad in French. Allez!

<u>PSRHE</u>: Relationships. The Maya and the Aztecs weren't so fond of one another. How can we ensure that we are being responsible, respectful and mindful with our peers? These are the questions we will explore this term.

A note to parents

Welcome to a new school year! For some, your last year at Trinity. Occasionally, I may set a topic—specific task that will be utilised in class. Please encourage your child to complete their homework independently before helping. Children are welcome to bring concerns regarding homework to myself or Mr Maynard in our Morning Challenge slot Monday through Thursday and we will happily guide them through any problems they encounter. Please also ensure your child has remembered to take learning aids if they have been provided, such as steps to success or visual aids to help reinforce the topic.

Reading: Independent reading should be encouraged at home as much as possible. This can include fiction, non-fiction (newspaper articles, online blogs, manuals etc.). Please sign off on the reading diary at the back of your child's Home School Diary as this will be checked every Friday.

Our P.E will run on Thursday afternoon and children should come dressed in their kits on this day. Children are always welcome to bring in work from home and this will be celebrated in class (with a dip in our treat box to boot!).
